

Who are the children?

The children who live at Baptist Children's Homes (BCH) are not strangers. They come to us from your community. They attend schools in your area. They are often your neighbors. In addition to offering care for these precious children, BCH also provides group homes for developmentally disabled adults, services for aging adults and an orphanage in Xela, Guatemala that cares for impoverished children.

Why do children come?

Family Crisis. Sometimes children come to BCH because of challenges within their family. We have the privilege of working with children and their families to help them overcome the specific issues that threaten to tear the family apart.

Abuse. Children also come because the adults in their lives have let them down. Far too often, boys and girls suffer abuse, neglect and abandonment at the hands of the adults they have trusted to love and care for them.

How are children referred?

Do you know a child or family who needs help overcoming the challenges they face? A referral to Baptist Children's Homes is not difficult or risky and it can be made by anyone. Children and families are referred by themselves, departments of social services, pastors, educators, juvenile services, concerned friends and family members. Many ministries beating with One

The heart of Baptist Children's Homes (BCH) beats with a rhythm of hope that extends to children, familes and adults. For each person's distinct need, there is a unique BCH service ready to help.

Caring homes for children. BCH provides cottage homes where professionally-trained child care workers (cottage parents) care for children in a Christian, family environment.

A nonprofit organization, BCH is nationally-accredited and uses a trauma-informed model to help boys and girls find healing. BCH's case managers work with family members, as appropriate, to help them identify and overcome their challenges. Emergency Care offers immediate care, up to 60 days, for a child during a family crisis. After Care is provided to a child and custodian after the completion of cottage homes services. Transitional Living helps older children learn the skills they need

Compassionate family foster homes. Family Foster Care is a service providing substitute residential care for a child over a planned period when his/her family or legal custodian cannot provide care. To be a foster family, visit **www.bchfostercare.org**

to live as independent adults once leaving BCH's care.

Helping hands for hard-working single mothers. Family Care provides a supportive environment for committed single mothers and their children in a residential setting. Family Care helps mothers obtain stability so they can provide for their family.

Loving haven for teen mothers and babies. Care House provides care and parental education to teenage mothers and their babies in a residential setting. The home provides an on-site day care.

Healing hurts through children's wilderness programs.

Residential Wilderness Camping is provided for boys and girls in a highly-structured, outdoor environment. Cameron Boys Camp and Camp Duncan for Girls give children and families an opportunity to overcome problems through a group process and alternative education program. Quality weekday education for children. Weekday Education is a community program offered for infants, toddlers, preschoolers and school-age care through five-star licensed centers in Thomasville. North Carolina Pre-K is available.

Caring outreach to families in crisis. Through the Tucker Greater Vision Center in Thomasville, a variety of physical and educational resources are offered to NC families in need of stability and support. In partnership with other organizations, Greater Vision provides food, preventative services, education classes and other resources to strengthen families and encourage spiritual growth.





Safe refuge for college students. HOMEBASE is a college student ministry aiding students at Western Carolina University in Cullowhee. The program offers support who have aged out of the children's residential and foster care systems and do not have adequate family support. It offers physical, emotional and spiritual programs and resources to help students achieve success.

Supportive homes for special needs adults. Developmental Disabilities Ministry offers special needs adults compassionate long-term residential care and the opportunity to reach their highest level of independence in community-based, gender specific group homes. Visit www.hereismyhome.org

Loving support for the frail aging. North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) is a dynamic resource dedicated to serving NC's aging and their families by providing information and referrals, connecting the aging and their families with resources to meet needs, and coordinating practical ministries.
